

NC 507 CoC Charter 2023

Immediate "Noticeable" changes:

- Lived Expertise Committee removed and added to each committee
- Committee Chairs are being identified. Only exception, each organization can chair only one committee at a time.

Revisions / Changes:

- Grammar & Clarity committees, member types, HUD requirements
- Consistent language throughout, ie: NC 507 CoC
- Executive Committee if it does not have 50% + 1 of its seats filled,
 the NC 507 Governing Board will fulfill the role
- Organizations may only have 1 seated Committee chair at a time –
 limits undue influence on the Executive Committee
- Governing Board Chair, at their discretion can declare a "closed session."
- Added CoC-HERC Committee
- Operating Year: Jan 1-Dec 31
- Review of Member and Gov BoD Mtg / requests for topics / presentations, etc. on agenda
- Grievance Policy
- CoC Membership Meeting to move to quarterly. Ever other meeting with be face to face.
- Lived Expertise Committee disbanded with requirement that EACH COMMITTEE MUST INCLUDE 1-2 PEOPLE WITH LIVED EXPERTISE.

System Design Clinic – Problem Solving and Diversion





Clinic Objectives:

The Alliance's two-part *Problem-Solving and Diversion Strategies Clinic* assists participants in understanding and implementing system-wide and program level problem-solving interventions, specifically problem solving and diversion-focused strategies.

Clinic participants will gain a deeper knowledge of the critical role that effective problem-solving and diversion strategies have on reducing homelessness across the crisis response system. In addition, participants will acquire an in-depth understanding of the core components of problem-solving, the guiding principles of diversion strategies, and the fundamentals of effective diversion practice including an intentional focus on the problem-solving conversation.

The Clinic is highly interactive with numerous group activities to ensure a comprehensive understanding of the role and practice of problem-solving strategies and builds upon the experience and expertise of those gathered to inform problem-solving practices.




- Street Outreach teams are currently engaging with 15 encampments around Wake County.




Street Outreach Demographics

EHV December Workgroup

- Continue to accept referrals for unsheltered persons for EHV.
 - We have about 15 EHV available
- Fair Share Housing Vouchers are also available for unsheltered families or families fleeing DV.
 - We currently have about 35 available.
- If a person with an EHV has been approved for housing but they are waiting on the unit to be ready (i.e., Walnut Trace), there is no need to submit the extension request.
- This Workgroup is currently seeking a facilitator.


